# • NATIVE AMERICAN RESEARCH CENTER FOR HEALTH PROGRAM DEVELOPED BY DR. DONNA RILEY

The Native American Research Center for Health (NARCH) is a multifaceted project funded by the National Institute of Health in order to study health problems in Native American populations as well as to mentor young Native Americans who are interested in careers in medical practice and research. As part of this effort, the California NARCH Directed Undergraduate Research (CANDUR) program was developed by Dr. Donna Riley, Chair of Cuyamaca College's Exercise Science and Health Education Department, to provide undergraduate Native American students with an opportunity to participate in biomedical research at the college level. Students are currently participating in projects at San Diego State University and Cuyamaca College Exercise Science Departments.

#### • CHAIR OF REGION X OCCUPATIONAL DEANS ENDS TERM

Dr. Al Taccone, Dean of Instruction, Division II, has served as Chair of the Region X Occupational Deans for the 2005-2006 academic year and has been Cuyamaca College's Region X Occupational Dean Representative since 2003.
