• INDUSTRY DRIVEN REGIONAL COLLABORATIVE GRANT FUNDED

Jan Ford, Math Instructor and West Vice President for the American Mathematical Association, has spearheaded AMATYC to adopt core values and a vision statement to strengthen its strategic plan. At AMATYC's spring board meeting, the vision statement

MARY SESSOM SELECTED TO PARTICIPATE IN THE JOINT CIVILIAN ORIENTATION CONFERENCE

Mary Sessom, Paralegal Instructor, has been selected as one of 45 people nationwide to participate in the Joint Civilian Orientation Conference (JCOC) sponsored by the Secretary of Defense for civilian public opinion leaders interested in growing their knowledge of the military and national defense issues. The JCOC received more than 400 nominations and 45 slots were available for 2006. JCOC's objective is to increase public understanding of national defense through a forum of free exchange among influential citizens, Department of Defense (DoD) officials, and military leadership. Ms. Sessom will have the opportunity to attend Pentagon briefings by DoD officials, military and civilian leadership and then join the military in the field observing exercises, firing weapons, and participating in training throughout the world.

Marsha Fralick Chosen for Publication

Dr. Marsha Fralick, Counselor and Personal Development Instructor, has had an article accepted for publication in the *National First Year Experience Monograph*, "Exploring the Evidence: Campus-Wide Initiatives in the First College Year." This monograph highlights programs which have significant outcomes in student success nationwide. Her article is a summary of the Personal Development Program Review in 2005 and is entitled, "Comprehensive College Success Courses Increase Student Persistence, Self-Confidence and Satisfaction." Her article provides data showing that students increased persistence by 27% as a result of successful completion of Personal Development 124, Lifelong Success.

Water and Wastewater Technology Instructor Published in "The Bull Sheet"

Water and Wastewater Technology Instructor Jon Jamison's article on the Water and Wastewater Technology Program at Cuyamaca College was published in the July 2006 edition of "The Bull Sheet," a monthly newsletter of the California Water Environment Association (CWEA). The article emphasizes the importance of pre-employment training and education provided by Cuyamaca College along with the advanced courses necessary to enhance industry personnel's opportunities for career advancement.
